Last year, we partnered with the Whittington Hospital and Nubian Jak to erect a statue to celebrate the vast contributions of the Windrush and Commonwealth nurses to the NHS and to our borough, and each year, we raise the Windrush flag to ensure that we continue to honour the many sacrifices and contributions made by the Windrush and Commonwealth generations to this country. Over 150 people joined us in-person for our Windrush Day celebrations earlier this year, marking the extensive and valuable contributions that the Windrush generation have given to our country.

Through our BH365 programme, we continue to create learning opportunities all year round for residents and staff to enrich knowledge, forge greater understanding and celebrate expressions of Black excellence and Black culture. Our staff Race Equality Network have been front and centre in driving positive changes for our staff and for our residents by creating opportunities for us to challenge ourselves as an organisation and as an employer, ensuring that we create a culturally competent and inclusive workplace and community where everyone feels valued.




ChainGang Cyclists Community Rides

British music journalist and author Lloyd Bradley talks to Daddy Ernie about his life as a DJ. Daddy Ernie was involved with **LWR**, widely regarded as the UK's first Black music station. Shortly after he had a brief stint with **Time FM** before hitting the big time with the first five-day-a-week reggae programme outside Jamaica. His show 'Super Jam' was born on **Choice FM** radio at the beginning of the 1990s.

Lorna Holder is a fashion designer, producer, writer and curator. She talks about the importance of archives and shares her experiences, collecting and using photographs



for her book 'Style in my DNA' which launched at the Victoria and Albert Museum (the V&A) and documents 70 years of Caribbean influence on British fashion.

It was during the late 1950s in Jamaica, at a very young age, when Lorna Holder first saw the importance of photography. Like many young children left behind in the Caribbean, while parents went to Britain to forge a better life for everyone, the exchange of photographs between Britain and Jamaica kept the family bonds. Lorna has over forty years of experience. The style of dress, lifestyle, social and political history captured in archive photographs and films inspired many of Lorna's fashion collections and were dominant in her multimedia productions.
