

2017

Finance Report

The financial performance of Hanley Crouch Community Association Ltd for the 2017/18 financial year is a surplus of £21,487. The charity has total reserves as at the year-end of £60,347, of which £2,946 were restricted revenue funds.

The centre historically found difficulties with containing spend within its incoming annual resources. The centre has strived to provide the highest possible level of services to meet the needs of the local community of one of London's most impoverished and disadvantaged areas (Tollington Ward) against a backdrop of reducing Council and grant funding. This led to the centre accepting a free of interest loan from Islington Council of £55,000 in 2007/08.

The centre is now a much more financially robust organisation as demonstrated by the fact that the organisation fully repaid the last remaining balance of this loan, £7,173 during 2014/15.

The community centre has dramatically improved both its financial management at an operational level and financial oversight at a Board of Trustees level over recent years.

These improvements have included:

• Annual budget accountability statements for each project prepared by Team Leaders and agreed by the Board of Trustees.

• Monthly forecasts prepared and presented to monthly Board of Trustees meetings, together with accounts receivable aged analysis reports to improve debt collection.

• Financial regulations have been reviewed and updated.

• Appointment of a chartered certified accountant to the Board of Trustees as Treasurer.

Hate Crime Forum

Colin Adams chairs the Islington Hate Crime Forum. The Forum brings around 20 community and faith organisations together and we meet on a quarterly basis.

The Forum has developed an action plan based on the following strategic aims:

- Raise Awareness of Hate Crime;
- □ Help reduce the risk of someone becoming the victim of Hate Crime;
- Provide support to victims of Hate Crime;
- Give guidance on how to report Hate Crime and increase the rate of sanctions.

The Forum arranged a series of events during National Hate Crime Awareness week in October which included the following:

- Giving out information at "Pop up" stalls at known Hate Crime "hot spots";
- Meetings with Community Groups to discuss the HC Forum and how they can become involved:
- Secured funding to develop an on-line training package on Hate Crime for "front line staff" within the council and community groups so they can raise awareness of Hate Crime;
- Held a series of workshops for community groups who are affected by Hate Crime and developed a community guide for users to report hate crime. One of the workshops was in Emirates Stadium where we had over 100 students attend.

CENTRE MANAGER'S REPORT

Finally moved in after much delay and exhausting time but staff were fantastic and we managed to move in and be operational within a week of moving. Our opening event received over 600 people attending.

It has been a great move and we can now offer so many more services including a:

- Community Nursery
- Health services
- More hall hire
- Community Café/Juice Bar
- Work placements, local opportunities.

There are still a few challenges with the building and need to see what our "running costs" will be but the feedback has been very positive, including the number of people coming in to find out what we do. We have increased users by at least 50% in the last four months.

By being on the main road it has made me realise the high level of vulnerable people walking up and down our street. We will make it our aim to give them more support and it is one of our priorities in the next few months and now we have the building to do this.

We were also successful in getting to stage 1 of the Placed Based Social Action programme. This is focused around residents taking control and leading on an issue that concerns or inspires them which is the origin of Hanley Crouch. We are working on submitting a proposal for Stage 2 which if successful will mean a "culture change" on how we develop community services in the Tollington Ward.

CHAIR'S REPORT



Well what a year 2018 has turn out to be for Hanley Crouch!

With just a tiny tinge of nostalgia we said farewell to the Laundry and despite all the hold ups we eventually moved into our brand new Brickworks building on Crouch Hill in January and are going each day from strength to strength. We are grateful to the excellent London Borough of Islington teams involved in this project for all the hours spent on planning, negotiating and organising on our behalf.

Our official opening was on 20th January, attended by over 600 people, the first of many great social gatherings!

One of the greatest advantages of the centre being on a main road is that we have increased our footfall by 50%. Yes, that's a lot more people accessing our services. We have also been able to host a variety of new activities at the centre, further extending our reach into the community.

I would like to thank all the staff, volunteers and trustees who all work tirelessly to ensure that the activities at the new building reflect the needs of the community.

A special note of thanks must go to Colin, our Centre Manager for living and breathing Hanley Crouch and now Brickworks. Without his dedication we would not be where we are today at our brand new building at 42 Crouch Hill!

Volunteering/Work Placements

As an organisation, without the support of our volunteers, we would not be able to provide the range of services that we currently deliver. In 2017 there were 10 volunteers offering an average total of 36 hours per week of unpaid time which, if valued at national living wage, demonstrates a total contribution of $\pounds12,576$.

Hanley Crouch has a long tradition of working with volunteers and all the projects we currently run have volunteers working with them. They provide a vital service and many of our volunteers have gone onto full time employment within the project they have worked with or within similar settings. We also aim to provide work placement students/ volunteers a rewarding and fulfilling experience within our organisation which should equip them with the necessary skills, behaviours and attitudes to progress within their chosen field. However, I do want to stress that there are a number of different volunteering opportunities and we would meet prior to you starting to determine what you would like to get out of the opportunity. Children's & Young People's Services

Hanley Crouch Community Association's Children's Services have been successfully working simultaneously within the Play Principles and Early Years

Foundation Stage (EYFS) frameworks. We can proudly say that combining both principles and curriculum enables us to use play so that the children can have the best possible start, build on their social skills, appreciate how in risks and challenges they can make valuable connections with the environment, and have fun.

After School Club Monday to Friday 3:15pm to 6:15pm (term time only) £11 per session 4-12yrs ASC understands that after a long day at school children just want to wind down and have fun. We provide a safe, stimulating, fun environment for children to do this, they are socialising with others and get to

learn new skills.

We are still currently collecting children from five local schools; St Gilda's Junior School, St Peter-inchains infant school, Christ the King primary, Ashmount and Pooles Park

primary school. We have had a very busy year. Our team have been working together for a while now and we have built a strong working relationship. As you may be aware we have now moved into our amazing new building which has given us great opportunities to do more activities. We have a large kitchen where children can do cooking activities. We have also partnered up with Octopus communities in

making our rough top garden a calm and safe place for the children to enjoy the outdoors.

Mondays – Circle Time, where the children are al-lowed to elaborate on what they have been up to over the weekend, which gives them a sense of in-dependence and builds confidence. Also on Monday is a Cooking Club where children can join in with the preparation of the snacks. **Tuesday** – Art Day, allowing the

children to express themselves creatively

Wednesday – Timbuktu Adventure Playground, this is a free play session **Thursday** – Movie Night/Football, Children have the chance to relax and watch a children friendly movie or for those that want burn some energy, we have football available at the nearby pitch.

Friday – Games Day, indoor hockey, badminton, table football and table tennis in the main hall. For children that want to do other things the nursery space is open for them to free play.



Holiday Play Scheme

Monday to Friday 8:30am to 6pm (half terms 9 weeks during the year) £20 per day (additional fees may apply for certain trips & outings, trips and outings are subject to change depending on weather)

The Holiday Play Scheme is designed to support working families as we know how hard it can be to get good affordable childcare that supports the individual needs of their children.

We provide a safe and stimulating environment, while planning activities and trips the ages and stages of development of

the children that attend. Our activities are varied to ensure all children get to enjoy something they love doing.

This year the children were lucky enough to get theatre tickets to Sadler's Wells and watch Arsenal play at the Emirates Stadium.

Our end of term party went with a bang, children got to enjoy a bouncy castle, coconut shy, tombola and more with lots of great prizes. We do this to also wish all our children transitioning into Secondary school good luck for their futures. Where they have learnt how to grow, pick & cook their own vegetables.

Under 5's - Stay & Play/Toy Library

Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday 10am to 12 noon Free service for under 5's

Our Stay & Play is an Ofsted registered free service used by children, parents, carers, nannies and childminders. Over the past year the service has proven ever popular with users travelling from all around the borough to attend. Stay and play sessions provide a wealth of benefits to both parents and their children, including:

- Children play both indoors and outdoors
- Build confidence and develop relationships with others
- Provide a friendly, welcoming atmosphere
- Make new friends, encouraging children to share and take turns
- Sessions include healthy snack time and songs and/or stories
- Receive support, advice and information from staff about issues that affect families with young children
- Advice and information relevant to family's needs such as:
- Calmer Night's sleep workshops to improve both parents and your
- child's sleep to feel more confident about your family's routine
- Information and workshops on Breastfeeding also induction to solids and an opportunity to meet other breastfeeding mothers



- Stress less workshops-Parents/carers learn about stress and ideas to help them stress less
- Healthy eating buying on a budget
- Under-fives Oral Health Hygiene (Teeth4Life) workshop
- Potty Training and advice workshops
- Elizabeth Dolane is the new Family Engagement worker from Bright start who is trained in delivering parenting programmes, antenatal, Incredible years and other services who will be working alongside Hanley crouch Stay & Play
- After Consulting with parents/carers Childminders we will be working to arrange the following workshops in the future:
